# ORDINANCE NO. <u>2017-874</u>

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HUNTERS CREEK VILLAGE, TEXAS, GRANTING A SPECIFIC USE PERMIT TO THE FIRST CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH TO ESTABLISH THE CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH THE CHURCH MAY OPERATE A FARMERS MARKET ON ITS PREMISES; CONTAINING FINDINGS AND OTHER PROVISIONS RELATING TO THE SUBJECT; PROVIDING A PENALTY IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$2000; AND PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY.

**WHEREAS**, the First Congregational Church (the "Church") is the owner of a church facility located at 10840 Beinhorn Road, within the corporate limits of the City of Hunters Creek Village, Texas (the "Church Premises");

**WHEREAS**, the Church Premises are located in District R (Single Family Residential) under the City's Zoning Chapter;

**WHEREAS**, under the Zoning Chapter, churches are now permitted in District R by specific use permit and, in the past were permitted by special exception;

WHEREAS, the Church, acting through its duly authorized representative, has presented an application to the City for a specific use permit establishing the conditions under which the Church is permitted to operate a farmers market on the Church Premises;

WHEREAS, the Planning & Zoning Commission of the City, after notice and hearing as required by law, has recommended that the City Council grant the requested specific use permit;

WHEREAS, the City Council, after notice and hearing as required by law, concludes that the use of the Church Premises for a weekly farmers market, under the conditions established in this Ordinance, is compatible with the purposes behind the District R regulations and an asset to the community; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council concurs with the recommendation of the Planning & Zoning Commission that the Church be granted a specific use permit to operate a farmers market on its premises.

NOW THEREFORE,

# BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HUNTERS CREEK VILLAGE, TEXAS:

**Section 1.** The findings contained in the preamble of this Ordinance are adopted.

<u>Section 2</u>. The First Congregational Church is hereby granted a specific use permit to operate a farmers market on the Church Premises located at 10840 Beinhorn Road, Hunters Creek Village, Texas, under the following conditions.

- **a. Hours of Operation**. The hours of operations of the farmers market are limited to Saturdays from 9:00 am to 1:00 pm.
- b. Limitations on vendors. The total number of vendors is limited to fifty. At least forty percent of the vendors must be farmers or cottage food producer. No more than ten percent of the fifty vendors can be craft sellers. There shall not be more than three food trucks, on the premises at a time.
- c. Alcoholic beverages. No consumption of alcohol shall be allowed for consumption on premises, other than small samples of wine or beer.
- d. Livestock. No sale of livestock is allowed.
- **e. Restrooms.** There shall be a minimum of two restrooms available for the use of those attending the farmers market.
- f. Trash disposal. The Church shall provide the number of waste bins necessary to serve the needs of the farmers market and shall take such other steps as are reasonably necessary to prevent littering.

<u>Section 3</u>. The specific use permit granted by this Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect until further action of the City Council.

<u>Section 4</u>. Any person who shall violate any provision of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, shall be fined in an amount not to exceed \$2,000. Each day of violation shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 5. In the event any clause, phrase, provision, sentence, or part of this Ordinance or the application of the same to any person or circumstance shall for any reason be adjudged invalid or held unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, it is the intention of the City Council that the invalidity or unconstitutionality of the one or more parts shall not affect, impair, or invalidate this Ordinance as a whole or any part or provision other than the part declared to be invalid or unconstitutional; and the City Council of the City of Hunters Creek Village, Texas, declares that it would have passed each and every part of the same notwithstanding the omission of any such part thus declared to be invalid or unconstitutional, whether there be one or more parts.





**WHEREAS**, the First Congregational Church (the "Church") is the owner of a church facility located at 10840 Beinhorn Road, within the corporate limits of the City of Hunters Creek Village, Texas (the "Church Premises"); and

**WHEREAS**, the Church Premises are located in District R (Single Family Residential) under the City's Zoning Chapter; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council of the City of Hunters Creek Village, Texas ("City") adopted Ordinance No. 2017-874 granting the Church Premises a Specific Use Permit to operate a farmer's market; and

**WHEREAS**, the Church, acting through its duly authorized representative, has presented an application to the City to amend the specific use permit to allow for the installation of a plaza cover on the Church Premises; and

WHEREAS, the Planning & Zoning Commission of the City, after notice and hearing as required by law, has recommended that the City Council, via a Final Report, grant the requested amendment to the specific use permit to allow for the installation of a plaza cover; and

**WHEREAS,** the City Council, after notice, acceptance of a Final Report from the Planning & Zoning Commission, and conducting a public hearing as required by law, concludes that the Church may install a plaza cover on the Church Premises:

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HUNTERS CREEK VILLAGE, TEXAS:

**Section 1.** The findings contained in the preamble of this Ordinance are adopted.

<u>Section 2</u>. The First Congregational Church is hereby granted an amendment to the specific use permit to operate a farmers market on the Church Premises located at 10840 Beinhorn Road, Hunters Creek Village, Texas, under the following conditions.







# Follow-up on Previous Month Items/Requests from Commission

The Finance Committee met and completed work on the 2026 budget for the department. The budget will be presented to the full commission in April for discussion and tentative approval and will be discussed with the cities at their April/May meetings with final votes requested in May/June.

# Personnel Changes/Issues/Updates

Staff continues to work on identifying suitable officer candidates. One applicant was tested on March 31, 2025, and is completing a personal history statement for the next phase of the selection process.

Commander Baker graduated from the FBI National Academy on March 13, 2025, in Quantico, VA and returned to duty on March 24, 2025.

# Major/Significant Events

On March 7, 2025, we experienced 2 car burglaries to contractor vehicles who were working in the area. MVPD officers were able to identify and later locate a suspect through the use of the ALPR system. One suspect was taken into custody and second suspect was identified.

On March 9, 2025, officers were dispatched to the area of Strey and Memorial after several car burglaries were reported. Officers were able to locate and arrest one suspect who in turn identified his accomplice.

On March 25, 2025, MVPD assisted HPD with a home invasion robbery in the Longwoods neighborhood area. MVPD was able to utilize ALPR data to identify the suspect's get-away vehicle and direct HPD to the area where the suspect vehicle was driving. HPD stopped and arrested the driver.

## Status Update on Major Projects

Vehicle upfitting was completed on the marked Tahoe's and they have been assigned to patrol. The new detectives vehicles have been received and are currently at the upfitter for radio and equipment installation.

### **Community Projects**

On March 4, 2025, the MVPF hosted the 6<sup>th</sup> Annual Birdies Fore Blues Golf Tournament in conjunction with students from Memorial High School. The fundraiser consisted of 34 teams that raised just over \$200k for the Foundation.

On 3/29/25, the MVPF hosted the 5<sup>th</sup> Annual Food Truck Rodeo at Chapelwood United Methodist Church. Hundreds of people attended the event and activities.

# Memorial Villages Police Department Summary FY2026 Budget Proposal

# **FY26 Proposed Budget Summary**

The Memorial Villages Police Commission has recommended adoption of the FY26 Budget proposal and is submitting that for approval by member cities. **The overall proposed budget is \$8,680,494.** However, the MVPD Chief is proposing utilizing \$100,000 presently held in the Special Capital Assets fund to offset the costs of the vehicle purchases, thereby submitting for approval an **FY2026 Budget Funding Request of \$8,580,494** which is an additional \$473,528 or 5.84 % increase over the FY25 **adopted** budget.

A comparative view and breakdown of the proposed budget is as follows:

### **100 PERSONNEL/BENEFITS:**

MVPD currently has forty-four full-time (FTEs) and one part-time employee. There are thirty-two sworn personnel, ten full-time telecommunications officers, two administrative personnel, and one part time records clerk. The Department also utilizes two former telecommunications officers on an as needed basis, along with a video/media intern.

This category includes salary, overtime, court/bailiff costs, TMRS allocation (estimated at 21% of gross earnings), 2.5% employer contributions to 457b accounts for full time employees, and the health benefits costs. The proposed budget continues to support the salary and retention plan specifically created to attract, hire, and retain the best and most qualified employees.

# **Retention Incentives:**

The Chief along with the Board of Police Commissioners is recommending a 4% base salary adjustment on January first, along with a 1% step increase, awarded on employment anniversary date. The Office/Human Resources Manager and Finance Manager will receive a 5% adjustment on January 1<sup>st</sup>.

To help strengthen the Department's commitment to employee retention, this proposal also includes increasing the night shift differential for eligible employees from \$3,601 to \$12,000 annually for full and from \$1,800 to \$6,000 split shift.

Additionally, the proposal seeks to implement a 3% base hourly rate adjustment to reclassify four officer positions to corporal positions. As well as implementing a sick leave buyback program, in which employees who have reached the maximum sick leave accrual (504 hours) are able to earn an additional 63.96 hours per year and then convert those hours into a year end payout at their current hourly rate.

Consideration and possible action to adopt a resolution: a) approving an agreement with the law firm of Linebarger Goggan Blair & Sampson, LLP, to act as special counsel to perform all legal services necessary to collect unpaid fines, fees and court costs as provided in Texas Code of Criminal Procedure Art. 103.0031; and b) authorizing the Mayor to sign the agreement on the City's behalf.

# REQUIRED LEGAL NOTICE

- (A) The above referenced agreement is necessary for the unpaid fines, fees and court costs owed to the City of Hunters Creek Village (the "City") to be collected in the most effective manner. The City desires that such unpaid fines, fees and court costs be collected as provided in the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure.
- (B) The Linebarger Goggan Blair & Sampson, LLP firm ("Linebarger") is fully qualified to provide this representation, being the largest law firm specializing in the collection of governmental receivables in the State of Texas, as well as the United States, and having been engaged in this specialized legal service for more than 40 years. In addition, Linebarger possesses infrastructure and technology, such as call center technology, that the City does not currently possess.
- (C) Linebarger has represented The City of Hunters Creek Village for the past six years (beginning in 2018) with competence and professionalism, in the collection of unpaid fines, fees and court costs.

- (D) The specialized legal services required by this agreement cannot be adequately performed by the attorneys and supporting personnel of the City due to the high cost of implementing the appropriate infrastructure and technology and employing sufficient in-house attorneys and staff with the level of experience and competence necessary to perform these activities.
- (E) Under the agreement, Linebarger will be compensated on a contingent fee basis as provided in Texas Code of Criminal Procedure Art. 103.0031. This Article specifically provides for an additional collection fee, in the amount of 30 percent, in certain cases to compensate collection attorneys. A contract to pay inside or outside attorneys on an hourly basis would represent an additional cost to the City.
- (F) Entering into the proposed agreement is in the best interests of the residents of the City because the unpaid fines, fees and court costs will be professionally and competently collected without the additional costs to the City of implementing infrastructure and technology and employing in-house personnel.

Councilmember Marks made a motion to adopt a resolution: a) approving an agreement with the law firm of Linebarger Goggan Blair & Sampson, LLP, to act as special counsel to perform all legal services necessary to collect unpaid fines, fees and court costs as provided in Texas Code of Criminal Procedure Art. 103.0031; and b) authorizing the Mayor to sign the agreement on the City's behalf. Councilmember Knox seconded the motion, and the motion was carried unanimously.

Discussion and possible action to adopt a resolution of the City of Hunters Creek Village, the City of Piney Point Village, the City of Bunker Hill Village, the City of Hedwig Village, the City of Spring Valley Village, and the City of Hilshire Village to form a committee to make recommendations to the city councils of each of the above-named cities regarding the response to proposed legislation.

Councilmember Cowell made a motion to adopt a resolution of the City of Hunters Creek Village, the City of Piney Point Village, the City of Bunker Hill Village, the City of Hedwig Village, the City of Spring Valley Village, and the City of Hilshire Village to form a committee to make

recommendations to the city councils of each of the above-named cities regarding the response to proposed legislation. Councilmember Marks seconded the motion, and the motion was carried unanimously.

#### JOINT PARTICIPATION INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT

This Joint Participation Interlocal Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into by and between **Harris County** ("County") the City of Houston ("COH"), and the City of Hunters Creek Village ("Hunters Creek") pursuant to the Interlocal Cooperation Act, Tex. Gov't Code Ch. 791.001, *et seq*. County, COH, and Hunters Creek may each be referred to herein individually as a "Party" or collectively as the "Parties".

#### **RECITALS**

WHEREAS, it is of mutual benefit to all Parties to construct improvements to the pavement along Memorial Drive from Chimney Rock to Greenbay Street. Located in Harris County Precinct 3, of which improvements include base repair, mill, overlay and update pavement markings, as generally illustrated on Exhibit A attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference ("Project");

WHEREAS, all Parties desire to cooperate in accordance with the terms of this Agreement to jointly accomplish the construction of the Project; and

WHEREAS, all Parties agree that all funds used under this Agreement shall be from current fiscal funds.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises, obligations, and benefits herein set forth, the Parties agree as follows:

#### **TERMS**

#### Section 1. Responsibilities of the Parties

#### A. County's Responsibilities

- (i) The County will provide or cause to be provided, engineering services and related support services necessary to prepare plans, specifications, and estimates ("PS&E") for the construction of the Project.
- (ii) The County shall be responsible for obtaining all necessary permits and jurisdictional approvals for construction of the Project.
- (iii) Upon completion of the PS&E the County will submit the PS&E to COH and Hunters Creek for review and approval.
- (iv) Upon approval by COH and Hunters Creek of the PS&E, the County will advertise for and receive bids for construction of the Project, in a manner similar to that of other County projects.
- (v) Upon receipt of bids for the construction of the Project the County shall determine the lowest and best bidder and provide the bids to the Parties with its

recommendation for award of the construction contract to such lowest and best bidder, as determined by the Harris County Commissioners Court.

- (vi) Upon award of a contract for construction of the Project, the County will:
  - (a) Manage and inspect the construction of the Project in a manner similar to that of other County construction projects; and
  - (b) Through its contractor, construct the Project in accordance with the PS&E approved by the Parties. The County may make minor changes in the PS&E through change(s) in contract ("CIC") that the County deems to be necessary or desirable during the construction of the Project, so long as the original scope and intent of the Project is maintained.
- (vii) During construction of the Project, the County is temporarily placing the road on the County Road Log. Upon completion of the Project, the County will remove the road from the County Road Log.
- (viii) Upon completion of the construction of the Project, the County shall provide an opportunity for the Parties to participate in a final walk-through and preparation of a punch list in regard to the construction of the Project.
- (iv) The County shall not be responsible for the maintenance of the Project.
- (v) The County shall invite the Parties to bi-weekly construction meetings.

#### B. COH's Responsibilities

- (i) COH will review the PS&E provided by the County and provide its approval within fourteen (14) days. Should COH desire to make changes to such PS&E, the Parties agree to meet and resolve all issues within fourteen (14) days of COH's receipt of the PS&E in order to finalize an agreed upon PS&E for the Project. If COH does not provide a response on the PS&E provided by the County within fourteen (14) days from its receipt of the PS&E, then the PS&E submitted to the City by the County will be deemed approved.
- (ii) Upon receipt of the bids and award recommendation from the County for construction of the Project, COH will review the bids and provide concurrence for award of the construction contract to such lowest and best bidder within five (5) business days from receipt of the recommendation from the County. If COH does not provide a response on the construction contract award recommendation within five (5) business days from its receipt of the recommendation from the County, then the recommendation submitted to COH will be deemed approved.
- (iii) COH may send a representative to attend the bi-weekly construction meetings.

(iv) COH will assume full responsibility for the ongoing maintenance and repairs of the Project within the COH city limits.

#### C. Hunters Creek's Responsibilities

- (i) Hunters Creek will review the PS&E provided by the County and provide its approval within fourteen (14) days. Should Hunters Creek desire to make changes to such PS&E, the Parties agree to meet and resolve all issues within fourteen (14) days of Hunters Creek's receipt of the PS&E in order to finalize an agreed upon PS&E for the Project. If Hunters Creek does not provide a response on the PS&E provided by the County within fourteen (14) days from its receipt of the PS&E, then the PS&E submitted to the City by the County will be deemed approved.
- (ii) Upon receipt of the bids and award recommendation from the County for construction of the Project, Hunters Creek will review the bids and provide concurrence for award of the construction contract to such lowest and best bidder within five (5) business days from receipt of the recommendation from the County. If Hunters Creek does not provide a response on the construction contract award recommendation within five (5) business days from its receipt of the recommendation from the County, then the recommendation submitted to Hunters Creek will be deemed approved.
- (iii) Hunters Creek may send a representative to attend the bi-weekly construction meetings.
- (v) Hunters Creek will assume full responsibility for the ongoing maintenance and repairs of the Project within the Hunters Creek city limits.

#### Section 2. Funding of the Project

Notwithstanding any provision in this Agreement to the contrary, the following provisions will apply to all payments made under this Agreement:

- A. The County agrees to provide \$1,750,000.00 of the construction cost necessary for the construction of the Project, as generally illustrated on Exhibit B attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.
- B. Parties agree that any construction costs incurred during the construction of the project or other work to be performed under this Agreement in excess of the construction contract award amount shall be funded by the County.

#### **Section 3. Term and Termination**

A. This Agreement shall commence upon final execution by all the Parties (the "Effective Date") and shall remain in full force and effect until the completion of construction of the Project ("Term").

B. This Agreement may be terminated by the County before award of the construction contract and at any time by mutual written consent of the Parties, or as otherwise provided under this Agreement.

#### **Section 4. Limitation of Appropriation**

- A. Parties understand and agree, said understanding and agreement also being of the absolute essence of this Agreement, that the County is not currently appropriating any funds for the Project. County may appropriate funds to complete the Project, but such funds shall not under any conditions, circumstances, or interpretations thereof exceed the sum certified available by the Harris County Auditor.
- B. Parties understand and agree, said understanding and agreement also being of the absolute essence of this Agreement, that failure of the Harris County Auditor to certify funds or to certify sufficient funding for any reason shall not be considered a breach of this Agreement.

#### Section 5. Miscellaneous

- A. <u>Non-Assignability</u>. The Parties bind themselves and their successors, executors, administrators, and assigns to the other Party of this Agreement and to the successors, executors, administrators, and assigns of such other Party, in respect to all covenants of this Agreement. No Party shall assign, sublet, or transfer its interest in this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other Parties.
- B. <u>Notice</u>. Any notice required to be given under this Agreement ("Notice") shall be in writing and shall be duly served when it shall have been (a) personally delivered to the addresses below, (b) deposited, enclosed in an envelope with the proper postage prepaid thereon, and duly registered or certified, return receipt requested, in a United States Post Office, addressed to the Parties at the following addresses:

Any Notice given by mail hereunder is deemed given upon deposit in the United States Mail and any Notice delivered in person shall be effective upon receipt.

Each Party shall have the right to change its respective address by giving at least fifteen (15) days' written notice of such change to the other Parties.

Other communications, except for Notices required under this Agreement, may be sent by electronic means or in the same manner as Notices described herein.

- C. <u>Independent Parties</u>. It is expressly understood and agreed by the Parties that nothing contained in this Agreement shall be construed to constitute or create a joint venture, partnership, association or other affiliation or like relationship between the Parties, it being specifically agreed that their relationship is and shall remain that of independent parties to a contractual relationship as set forth in this Agreement. The County is an independent contractor and neither it, nor its employees or agents shall be considered to be an employee, agent, partner, or representative of COH or Hunters Creek for any purpose. Neither COH, nor its employees, officers, or agents shall be considered to be employees, agents, partners or representatives of the County or Hunters Creek for any purposes. Neither Hunters Creek, nor its employees, officers, or agents shall be considered to be employees, agents, partners or representatives of the County or COH for any purposes. No Party has the authority to bind any of the other Parties.
- D. <u>No Third Party Beneficiaries</u>. This Agreement shall be for the sole and exclusive benefit of the Parties and their legal successors and assigns. The County is not obligated or liable to any party other than the Parties for the performance of this Agreement. Nothing in the Agreement is intended or shall be deemed or construed to create any additional rights or remedies upon any third party. Further, nothing contained in the Agreement shall be construed to or operate in any manner whatsoever to confer or create rights or remedies upon any third party, increase the rights or remedies of any third party, or the duties or responsibilities of the County with respect to any third party.
- E. <u>Waiver of Breach</u>. No waiver or waivers of any breach or default (or any breaches or defaults) by any Party hereto of any term, covenant, condition, or liability hereunder, or the performance by any Party of any obligation hereunder, shall be deemed or construed to be a waiver of subsequent breaches or defaults of any kind, under and circumstances.
- F. No Personal Liability; No Waiver of Immunity.
  - (1) Nothing in the Agreement is construed as creating any personal liability on the part of any officer, director, employee, or agent of any public body that may be a Party to the Agreement, and the Parties expressly agree that the execution of the Agreement does not create any personal liability on the part of any officer, director, employee, or agent of the County.

- (2) The Parties agree that no provision of this Agreement extends the County's liability beyond the liability provided for in the Texas Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.
- (3) Neither the execution of this Agreement nor any other conduct of either Party relating to this Agreement shall be considered a waiver by the County of any right, defense, or immunity on behalf of itself, its employees or agents under the Texas Constitution or the laws of the State of Texas.
- G. <u>Applicable Law and Venue</u>. This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Texas and the forum for any action under or related to the Agreement is exclusively in a state or federal court of competent jurisdiction in Texas. The exclusive venue for any action under or related to the Agreement is in a state or federal court of competent jurisdiction in Houston, Harris County, Texas.
- H. <u>No Binding Arbitration; Right to Jury Trial</u>. The County does not agree to binding arbitration, nor does the County waive its right to a jury trial.

#### I. Contract Construction.

- (1) This Agreement shall not be construed against or in favor of any Party hereto based upon the fact that the Party did or did not author this Agreement.
- (2) The headings in this Agreement are for convenience or reference only and shall not control or affect the meaning or construction of this Agreement.
- (3) When terms are used in the singular or plural, the meaning shall apply to both.
- (4) When either the male or female gender is used, the meaning shall apply to both.
- J. <u>Recitals</u>. The recitals set forth in this Agreement are, by this reference, incorporated into and deemed a part of this Agreement.
- K. <u>Entire Agreement; Modifications</u>. This Agreement contains the entire agreement between the Parties relating to the rights herein granted and the obligations herein assumed. This Agreement supersedes and replaces any prior agreement between the Parties pertaining to the rights granted and the obligations assumed herein. This Agreement shall be subject to change or modification only by a subsequent written modification approved and signed by the governing bodies of each Party.
- L. <u>Severability</u>. The provisions of this Agreement are severable, and if any provision or part of this Agreement or the application thereof to any person, entity, or circumstance shall ever be held by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional for any reason, the remainder of this Agreement and the application of such provision or part of this Agreement to other persons, entities, or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

- M. <u>Survival of Terms</u>. Any provision of this Agreement that, by its plain meaning, is intended to survive the expiration or earlier termination of this Agreement shall survive such expiration or earlier termination. If an ambiguity exists as to survival, the provision shall be deemed to survive.
- N. <u>Multiple Counterparts/Execution</u>. This Agreement may be executed in several counterparts. Each counterpart is deemed an original and all counterparts together constitute one and the same instrument. In addition, each Party warrants that the undersigned is a duly authorized representative with the power to execute the Agreement.
- O. <u>Warranty</u>. By execution of this Agreement, the Parties warrant that the duties accorded to the Parties in this Agreement are within the powers and authority of the Parties.

This Interlocal Agreement ("Agreement") is made and entered into pursuant to the Interlocal Cooperation Act (TEX. GOV'T CODE ANN., Ch. §791) by and between the City of Hunters Creek Village, a municipal corporation under the laws of the State of Texas (hereinafter referred to as "Hunters Creek") and the City of Hedwig Village, a municipal corporation under the laws of the State of Texas (hereinafter referred to as "Hedwig").

#### WITNESSETH, that

WHEREAS, Hedwig has proposed to repair or replace the sidewalk within the north twenty (20) feet of Beinhorn Road right-of-way from the west boundary line of Brogden Road right-of-way to the east boundary line of the Hedwig Road right-of-way; and

WHEREAS, the portion of the Beinhorn Road right-of-way upon which the sidewalk is to be repaired or replaced is entirely within the city limits of Hunters Creek; and

WHEREAS, Hunters Creek is willing to allow the sidewalk repair or replacement in order to provide bicycle and pedestrian access, provided Hedwig agrees to comply with all of Hunters Creek's city ordinances and all applicable state and federal laws; and

WHEREAS, it is to the benefit of Hunters Creek and Hedwig and the Hunters Creek and Hedwig residents to enter into this Agreement and to undertake the repair or replacement of the sidewalk.

**NOW THEREFORE**, for and in consideration of the mutual covenants, agreements, and benefits to the parties herein named, the parties hereby agree as follows:

- 1. Subject to and upon the terms and conditions set forth herein, Hunters Creek hereby grants Hedwig a temporary nonexclusive right and easement for the repair or replacement of the sidewalk in the area referenced above.
- 2. The rights granted hereby are subject to the rights of Hunters Creek, and Hunters Creek accepts and reserves right of passage over the above-described easement for persons and vehicles.
- 3. All plans and specifications for the initial repair or replacement of the sidewalk, as well and for any subsequent alteration, improvement or removal of the sidewalk, must be submitted to and approved by Hunters Creek in writing prior to any work being done in connection with such installation, alteration, improvement or removal.
- 4. Hedwig, at its expense, will be responsible for preparation of construction plans and specifications, and will administer bidding, construction, inspection, materials testing and

surveying of the sidewalk. Hedwig shall not undertake, or cause to be undertaken, any alterations or modifications of the sidewalk pursuant to this Agreement without first securing the approval of Hunters Creek of the plans and specifications for the same. Hedwig shall apply for and obtain all construction permits required by Hunters Creek City Ordinances; provided, however, that Hunters Creek agrees that no fee will be charged for the issuance of such permits with respect to working on the sidewalk.

- 5. During construction, Hunters Creek shall have the right to inspect the sidewalk and to review all documents, maps, plats, records, photographs, reports, or drawings affecting said construction.
- 6. All notices and communications under this Agreement shall be mailed by certified mail, return receipt requested, or delivered by messenger to Hunters Creek at the following address:

City of Hunters Creek Village 1 Hunters Creek PI Houston, Texas 77024 Attention: City Administrator

7. All notices and communications under this agreement shall be mailed by certified mail, return receipt requested, or delivered by messenger to the Hedwig at the following address:

City of Hedwig Village, Texas 955 Piney Point Road Houston, Texas 77024 Attention: City Administrator

- 8. This Agreement will remain in effect for as long as the repair or replacement of the sidewalk is under construction; provided, however, that Hunters Creek shall have the right to terminate this Agreement upon thirty (30) days prior written notice if Hedwig fails to perform is obligations under paragraph 3 above.
- 9. Following the repair or replacement of the sidewalk within the specified area, Hunters Creek, at its expense, will repair and maintain the sidewalk.
- 10. The parties recognize that the sidewalk is a fixture or improvement that is being installed on property that is owned or controlled by Hunters Creek. Accordingly, the sidewalk and any alterations, additions or changes to the sidewalk will become the property of Hunters Creek and will remain upon the property and be surrendered by Hedwig upon the expiration or termination of this Agreement, and Hedwig hereby waives all rights to any payment or compensation therefore.
- 11. This Agreement is not intended to and shall not create a joint enterprise between Hedwig and Hunters Creek. The parties hereto are undertaking governmental functions or services under this Agreement and the purpose hereof is solely to further the public good, rather than any pecuniary purpose. The party undertaking work under this Agreement shall have responsibility for

day-to-day management and control of the sidewalks acquired pursuant to this Agreement upon which such work is performed, except as may otherwise expressly be provided herein.

- 12. Hunters Creek hereby reserves for itself, its successors and assigns, the right to use the Beinhorn Road right-of-way for any and all purposes, including but not limited to the right to construct, operate, maintain, repair, replace, change the size of and remove roadways, drainage facilities, pipelines, utilities and any other structures that Hunters Creek may desire in, on, under, or over the Beinhorn Road right-of-way, and to grant such rights to others, provided that such use does not substantially and materially interfere with Hedwig's use and enjoyment of the rights and privileges granted herein, but subject to the terms and provisions hereof.
- 13. No party hereto shall make, in whole or in part, any assignment of this Agreement or any obligation hereunder without the prior written consent of the other part hereto. This instrument contains the entire Agreement between the parties relating to the rights herein granted and the obligations herein assumed. Any modification concerning this instrument shall be of no force or effect, excepting a subsequent modification in writing signed by all parties hereto.



#### ORDINANCE NO. <u>679</u>

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF HUNTERS CREEK VILLAGE, TEXAS TO REVISE CERTAIN PROVISIONS GOVERNING THE REQUIRED INSTALLATION OF FIRE PROTECTION SPRINKLER SYSTEMS IN NEW AND EXISTING BUILDINGS AND STRUCTURES; AND PROVIDING A PENALTY OF AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$2000.00 FOR VIOLATION OF ANY PROVISION OF THE ORDINANCE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HUNTERS CREEK VILLAGE, TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 3.102 (o) of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Hunters Creek Village, Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 903, entitled 'Automatic Sprinkler Systems" is deleted. Automatic sprinkler systems are required as provided by Section 5.102 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Hunters Creek Village."

Section 2. Section 3.203 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Hunters Creek, Village, Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Automatic sprinkler systems are required as provided by Section 5.102 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Hunters Creek Village."

Section 3. Section 5.102 (b) of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Hunters Creek Village, Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 903.2 of the International Fire Code, as adopted and amended by the City of Hunters Creek Village, is further amended to read as follows:

'An automatic sprinkler system shall be installed, and maintained in operating condition, in all new and existing buildings and structures containing an enclosed area of 1000 square feet or more and built for, or to be utilized as, any of the occupancy classifications defined by the International Fire Code, except Miscellaneous Group U.

Provided however, that an automatic sprinkler system shall not be required for an existing building or structure unless and until:

- a) the enclosed floor area of the building or structure, as it existed on the effective date of this ordinance, is increased by 50% or more; or
- b) for a non-residential occupancy classification, 50% or more of the existing enclosed floor area of the building is renovated, remodeled or restored; or
- c) for a residential occupancy classification, 50% or more of the space within the dwelling used for living, sleeping, eating, cooking, bathing, washing, and sanitation purposes is renovated, remodeled, or restored."

And provided further that an automatic sprinkler system shall not be required in spaces or areas in telecommunication buildings used exclusively for telecommunications equipment, associated electrical power distribution equipment, batteries, and standby engines, if those spaces or areas are equipped throughout with an automatic fire alarm system and are separated from the remainder of the building by a wall with a fire-resistance rating of not less than 1 hour and floor/ceiling assembly with a fire-resistance rating of not less than 2 hours.

Section 4. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency or conflict.

Section 5. Any person, corporation, or other entity that violated any provision of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in an amount not to exceed \$2,000.00. Each day on which a violation occurs and each separate occurrence of any violation shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 6. In the event any provision or part of this Ordinance or its application to any person or circumstance is for any reason adjudged invalid or held unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, it is the intention of the City

Council that the remaining provisions of the Ordinance be given full force and effect. To that end, the City Council declares that it would have passed each and every provision of the Ordinance notwithstanding the omission of any part that might have later been declared invalid or unconstitutional.
